2. Program Updates

VITA: All original appointments have been filled for the 2018 **Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program**. Over 240 appointments were made, the most in the past 3 years. Limited additional appointments were added for the end of March.

Faith In Action Driver Appreciation Luncheon is being planned for April 20th at the Avon VFW. Sixty-four (64) volunteers will be invited to enjoy lunch and fellowship. This is a collaborative of Catholic Charities, OFA, Veterans Services and RSVP.

Videos from Tai Chi/Senior Fitness and Congregate Site now on the County's website and Facebook site! Thank you to Heather Grant.

Tai Chi for Arthritis class wrapped up in Geneseo 3/15/2018. Participants want to continue and there is still substantial interest. A class will be held in Dansville starting in May. We are looking at possibilities to run

another class in Geneseo and offer an opportunity for those who have completed the class to have an opportunity to continue to practice.

Livingston County is one of a group of counties that will have the opportunity to be trained to offer the **Aging** Mastery Program, a program developed by the National Council on Aging.

Senior Nutrition Program was closed on March 2, 2018. The meal from that day was delivered the next week along with the regular meals to replace the emergency meal. St. Patrick's Day Celebrations were held at each congregate site on March 15th. National Service Recognition Day events are planned for each site on April $3^{\rm rd}$.

LCOFA participated in the **Diabetes Wellness and Education Fair** on 3/21 from 4 – 7 at Noyes Hospital.

LCOFA and LCDSS presented at the Emergency Medical Services Captain's Meeting about services of each agency and referrals from EMS to both. It was suggested that we develop in addition a longer training to be offered to EMTs as professional development.

Rural Health Grants were cut 20% for the second year in a row. **Home Safe Home funding** ends March 31, 2018 and no more appointments will be scheduled. We are looking at ways to fund this in the future.

Center For Nursing And Rehabilitation:

- Create one full-time Director of Fiscal Services position at the salary range of \$74,000-\$85,500.
- Delete one full-time Director of Fiscal Services position upon the retirement of Barbara Keefe.

Director's Comments:

Director of Fiscal Services Barbara Keefe will retire COB June 1, 2018. Director Bassett requests to create a parallel Director of Fiscal Services position to enable hiring a successor and establishing a start date that would accommodate a 1-2 weeks transition between the incumbent and successor. The position held by Barbara Keefe would be deleted following her retirement.

Mr. Bassett explained that Bonadio has been assisting in the job search. The posting is going out to the papers and Indeed today or tomorrow. The salary range is \$74,000-\$85,500. Mrs. Donohue reported that the County

Administrator supports this action.

- 1. FINANCIAL/OPERATIONAL UPDATES:
- a.) Occupancy As of March 25, occupancy was 92.1% for the month, YTD 93.58%. There has been a significant shift in the last few months. Elected procedures have been delayed scheduling until after the flu season.
 - b.) Cash Flow The CNR's Cash Flow Report as of March 23, 2018 reflects \$25,181,999.00 in reserves.
- c.) Budget Variance The January 2018 budget variance report will be distributed and discussed at the committee meeting. Budget is at 97%. There are always a number of days for private pay that are reclassified as Medicaid days bringing alignment closer to the budgeted revenue number.
- d.) Dialysis Extension Clinic (DEC) UR Medicine Noyes Health CEO Amy Pollard has executed the lease agreement for the DEC. We have not received an executed original lease yet for processing. Bid packages have been prepared by NPV and LaBella Architects and were scheduled for release on March 29. Recommendations for contract awards will be presented in May to Public Services. If everything proceeds smoothly, construction can begin in late May-early June. The CON was modified to give us a better window to start construction. The lease deems occupancy to be when a case load of 12 in-house CNR residents requiring hemo-dialysis services are in place. The therapy suite will be vacated during construction and moved to staff development space. Scheduling will need to be handled differently to accommodate the smaller area limits. A safety plan will be sent to NYDOH for approval. Mr. Bassett reviewed the FMLA lists and the staffing difficulties.

Steve Woodruff will be assuming a greater role in the organization and he will be presenting to Committee starting in May. Steve will take over as Administrator of Record responsibilities on May 1.

- 1. Reports Absenteeism & Mandation, FMLA, Payroll Performance, Workers Compensation.
- 2. NYS Department of Health The CNR has been deemed in Substantial Compliance following an off-site re-certification review of records submitted to evidence correction of deficiencies identified during the DOH Certification Survey which concluded December 28, 2017. The NYS DOH will not conduct its next Certification Survey of the CNR for 9 to 15 months. The CMS 5-Star rating system rates the CNR as 3-Star, equating to Average.
- 3. Nurse Assistant Training Graduates A graduation ceremony is scheduled in the CNR atrium on Wednesday, April 18 for 19 graduates of the FLCC program. 18 of the participants have expressed employment interest with the CNR, 13 have completed applications to date.
- 4. Construction Notice Director Bassett electronically filed documents with the NYS Department of Health in March to establish the Energy Performance Upgrades project. Submissions included a list of individual Facility Improvement Measures (FIM), project budget, timeline, and Safety Plan. Danforth has begun installation activities.
- 5. Greater Rochester Mutual Aid Plan Deputy Director Stephen Woodruff has accepted a one-year term to continue serving as Co-Chair of the work group responsible for coordination of the mutual aid plan and participant response preparedness.
- 6. 2018 County Worker United Way Campaign As of March 23 the County Worker Campaign has raised \$18,788. The campaign will conclude with a Final Results presentation at the April 25 Board of Supervisors meeting.

WHEREAS, about one in every five U.S. adults — or more than 43 million people — experience mental illness in a given year. And one in five youth ages 13 to 18 experience a severe mental disorder at some point in their lives. Mental illness is associated with billions of dollars in care and lost productivity each year;

WHEREAS, to date, the world has eradicated only one infectious human disease, smallpox, and one animal disease, rinderpest. (Though after decades of work, we're closer than ever to eradicating polio, too.) What keeps the rest of those communicable diseases at bay is prevention. And that requires a combination of strong public health systems, access to medical and preventive care and individual responsibility;

WHEREAS, in the U.S., air pollution contributes to thousands of premature births and costs billions of dollars. In 2007, asthma cost the U.S. \$56 billion in medical care, lost productivity and premature death. Costs of childhood lead poisoning are also in the billions (though each dollar invested in controlling the environmental hazard returns up to \$200 in savings). The economic benefit of cleaning up mercury and other air toxins is in the billions — not to mention the up to 46,000 premature deaths that could be prevented;

WHEREAS, in 2016, preventable unintentional injuries took the lives of a record 161,000 Americans and became the nation's third leading cause of death. The U.S. unintentional injury rate spiked 10 percent between 2015 and 2016 — the biggest single-year increase since 1936. Much of that spike was driven by an opioid overdose epidemic that's killing about 115 people every day;

WHEREAS, all people deserve the opportunity to live long, healthy and productive lives. In fact, offering all people the tools and conditions associated with better health and less disease is an investment that comes with generations of positive returns; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, by the Livingston County Board of Supervisors, that the Supervisors-

- (1) Support the observance of National Public Health by partnering across public and private sectors to make sure decisions are made with the public's health in mind;
- (2) Recognize and applaud the Livingston County Department of Health for providing information about the importance of prevention and making healthy life choices for the residents of Livingston County;
- (3) Urge residents of Livingston County to observe this week by working together to build healthier communities. By helping our families, friends, neighbors, co-workers and leaders they will better understand the value of public health and adopt preventive lifestyle habits in light of this year's theme, "Changing Our Future Together."

The State of the County Health Event is the main event for this week. You will need to RSVP to Noyes to attend. There will be a lot of awareness information shared.


