WHEREAS, SUNY Geneseo was established as the Wadsworth Normal and Training School on September 13, 1871; and

WHEREAS the first athletic competitions took place in 1896 with football and men's track and field; and

WHEREAS the School persisted through World Wars I and II; and

WHEREAS the institution's name in 1942 was changed to Geneseo State Teachers College, attaining full collegiate status and the authority to confer baccalaureate degrees in every curriculum; and

WHEREAS, in 1962 the College officially became the State University College at Geneseo, erecting seven new buildings in 1967 alone; and

WHEREAS, the College now offers 50 undergraduate degree programs, 26 interdisciplinary minors, and graduate programs in accounting and education; and

WHEREAS, September 13, 2021, marks SUNY Geneseo's 150th anniversary. Such a monumental milestone is cause for commemoration and celebration throughout the year with historical, educational, artistic, and joyful events; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Livingston County Board of Supervisors hereby recognizes the importance of honoring the past 150 years of SUNY Geneseo's rich history and encourages all County departments, organizations, academic institutions, and citizens to be a part of this year-long celebration in observance of this rare and important anniversary. WHEREAS, there is a matter pending on behalf of Livingston County regarding the opioid addiction crisis, in which Livingston County is a named plaintiff in the action (the "Action"); and

WHEREAS, the Action is against several defendants, including manufacturers of opioids, distributors of opioids and chain pharmacies; and

WHEREAS, the Action alleges several causes of action against defendants Johnson & Johnson, Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., Ortho-McNeil-Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc. and Janssen Pharmaceutica, Inc. ("J & J") based on

claims that J & J contributed to the opioid epidemic by falsely promoting prescription opioids it manufactured and sold and by falsely promoting the increased use of opioids directly and generally through various "front groups" and failing to implement measures to prevent diversion of prescription opioids in connection with distribution of its products, all of which contributed to a public health crisis in Livingston County; and

WHEREAS, J & J has offered to settle the claims of Livingston County against it by paying the sum of between approximately \$169,149.25 and \$394,756.35 over ten (10) years to be used for restitution and abatement and agreeing to no longer manufacture, sell or promote opioids; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of Livingston County to resolve this matter with respect to J & J without further litigation and enter into the proposed Agreement as it shall settle all allegations against J & J and avoid protracted litigation; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Livingston County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the J & J settlement agreement and release ("Agreement"); and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Livingston County Board of Supervisors or his designee is hereby authorized to execute the proposed Agreement on behalf of Livingston County and such other documents as may be necessary and appropriate to effectuate the settlement with J & J.

2. 23rd ANNUAL EMPLOYEE RECOGNITION CEREMONY - HONORING EMPLOYEES WITH 10 AND 25 YEARS OF FULL-TIME SERVICE

Chairman David LeFeber

I would like to welcome everybody to the 23rd Annual Employee Recognition. I am so glad we are doing this, even though it is an event we planned on doing last year. It is a great chance to recognize and honor our employees. The people who are really our link between us, the things we do. Department heads and the employees are really the folks who are out there dealing with our constituency and doing a great job of it. Thank you all for all that you do and all your years of service for Livingston County.

County Administrator Ian Coyle

I echo the Chairman's comments, welcome everybody and thank you for being here. Michele will go over the logistics after I say a few words and recognize all of you for the work you are doing. As the Chairman said, we weren't able to get together last year so we are actually doing two of these sessions, with the first being today honoring those that first began working for us in 1994 and 2009.

I am personally very proud and happy to be standing up here in front of all of you to say a few words. We are celebrating the County workforce milestone anniversaries today. I am also very grateful to be standing up here, period, because, as David said, we could not do this last year. We had to work around a few little things today, so please bear with us on some of the very small, subtle changes, but again, we are very grateful that we can be here today in this type of environment and provide you all with a thank you. I'm also blessed to be in the company of incredible public servants; all of you here in the audience today. These are the essential workforce members that we hear so much about. You are all the frontline staff; you are the heroes of the pandemic response. The wheels of county government did not stop turning because a pandemic hit. In fact, in many areas we had to actually ramp up service provision to respond to the situation. I could not be more proud of the work and the Board could not be more proud of the work of the County workforce and all of the employees over the last 18 months. So, what is employee recognition? It's a time to reflect on the service tenure of all of you very dedicated employees. It's an opportunity to take some time out of our busy schedules to express some appreciation for the doers in county government and you all make county government work. I would be remiss if I didn't add some facts and figures as I always do from the Historian's office on where you were in 1994 and 2009 and what was going on; a few local things to national things to jog your memories. In 2009, we had the ribbon cutting for the newly renovated Building 1, we started work on the jail, Barak Obama was inaugurated and, crazy coincidence, we had a Swine flu global pandemic declared. Going way back to 1994, we were dealing, as a county and a community, with the aftermath of the mine collapse, nationally, OJ was fleeing police in a white bronco, the cost of gas was \$1.11 and the Dallas Cowboys handed the Buffalo Bills their fourth, well you know... I do these Conversations with the County, town hall forums, once a month and I talk to residents about a lot of things. Sometimes we get some complaints and kudos and we get a lot of stuff in between. I always give them a little of what I call County Government 101. I talk to all those listening about what Livingston County government does, for the value of your taxes this is what your county government does each and every day. I talk about how we started 200 years ago and then I fast forward to the incredible work that is done in 2021. I also tell a few scenario stories. I want to provide you with one example today because it gives a little context of what I'm talking about. A simple fall, a 911 call comes

to Livingston County, the Sheriff's Office runs 911 in Livingston County. An elderly man has fallen down, so the Sheriff responds. There's an injury so County Emergency Medical Services, another County department, also responds. They drive over a County highway road and highway bridge that we maintain to get to the scene. The victim is treated and there are some mental health concerns with the individual and a referral is made to that department, also a County division. Additionally, it is found out that the gentleman is due for his second vaccine shot and he is scheduled through our Department of Health for that second shot. The individual was down on his luck and lost his job as well, so he is referred to the County Workforce Development Office about job options. He gets some information from DSS/Social Services to see about public assistance to maybe get back on his feet. The same elderly individual who fell is also a veteran and when being treated for medical care realizes that there are additional benefits that he is entitled to, so he goes to our Veterans Services Office. Because of his injuries, he temporarily has to rehab and does a short stint at CNR for those therapy services. Once back at home, he returns to his daily deliveries of meals from the Office for the Aging. That is nearly a dozen service areas touched in County government with one single random incident that has probably happened many, many times. While this particular example I chose starts with an unfortunate origin, which is a fall, countless other examples abound whereby the service touch points are many, involving a clinic, a trip to the DMV, changing enrollment for an election, having some service or need met by County government. The point being, County government workforce is a true life cycle service provider. The departments being recognized here today are a diverse set of areas with one goal in mind; to offer and provide best in class service to all visitors, residents, taxpayers, clients and customers. If you look at this list in the program, we have the nursing home, Central Services, County Clerk, Treasurer, Department of Health, Department of Social Services, Highway, Probation and Sheriff. All of those departments do their normal and customary job and I know for a fact that all of those departments had representatives redeploy or reposition themselves during the last eighteen months to do other things beyond what their job description says that they should do, so they should also be recognized for that. You have all done your part, the first part showing up-You show up and work and treat people professionally and with respect and in turn, you are the face and the public window to County government as an employer and as an organization. You are the front door, you're the welcome mat and you're the cogs and the wheel that make things happen and get the work done. For some members of the public, the Pandemic opened their eyes to the everyday, heroic, daily valued efforts made up by countless individuals that dedicate their work lives to serving their community. For us in County government, we had the heads up years and years ago. We know our people and we know the response effort will be there, and we, and you would not skip a beat. Do not take for granted the opportunity you have been given to do the peoples work. On behalf of the Board, thank you for your public service to your neighbors, to the Livingston County community and congratulations on your recognition. It is well-deserved and we are grateful to have you here as part of our employee team. For those being recognized today, I say to you, "today is an excellent time to contemplate how far things have come in Livingston County government as we celebrate our 200th anniversary and to think about your roll or the rolls you played in shaping County government and County service within the time periods of your employment here with us. You have made a difference, you continue to make a difference and for that we thank you". I'd like to start with a round of applause for all of you before we begin the individual recognitions.

Before turning it over to Michele, I would like to start as you can't really recognize yourself. We also designate those that are a department head that are also receiving a service award. Michele is a long-time County employee, 25+ years and was the Secretary to the County Administrator for many years and then transferred over to the Clerk of the Board, serving the Board of Supervisors and the County as a whole at large. I would like to recognize Michele for her 25 years of service. Also, not just a service tenure, but to recognize Michele, Ashley, Lisa and others in my office that have a part in making all of this happen today. I want to thank them for all of their efforts in getting to today and making this happen in light of everything that is going on.
