RESOLUTION NO. 2021-312 AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING A SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT TO AN ACTION RELATING TO THE OPIOID CRISIS – BIG 3 DISTRIBUTORS

Mr. Pangrazio presented the following resolution and moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, there is a matter pending on behalf of Livingston County, regarding the opioid addiction crisis, in which Livingston County is the named plaintiff in the action (the “Action”); and

WHEREAS, the Action is against several defendants, including manufacturers of opioids, distributors of opioids and chain pharmacies; and

WHEREAS, the Action alleges several causes of action against defendants McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc., AmerisourceBergen Drug Corporation, PSS World Medical, Inc., Kinray, LLC, Bellco Drug Corporation, and American Medical Distributors, Inc. (the “Distributors”) based on claims that the Distributors contributed to the opioid epidemic by failing to comply with their obligations under the federal Controlled Substances Act and the New York Controlled Substances Act to implement adequate measures to prevent diversion of the prescription opioids they distributed to pharmacies and others in Suffolk County, all of which contributed to a public health crisis in Livingston County; and

WHEREAS, the Distributors have offered to settle the claims of Livingston County against them by paying the sum of between approximately \$1,008,384.86 and \$1,781,297.41 over eighteen (18) years and agreeing to implement injunctive relief under a controlled substance monitoring program; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of Livingston County to resolve this matter with respect to the Distributors

without further litigation and enter into the proposed settlement agreement as it shall settle all allegations against the Distributors and avoid protracted litigation; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Livingston County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the proposed settlement agreement and authorizes the Chairman of the Board or his designee to execute said agreement and such other documents as may be necessary and appropriate to effectuate the settlement with the Distributors.

WHEREAS, the County of Livingston desires to advance the Project by making a commitment of 100% of the non-federal share of the costs of Preliminary Engineering, Design, ROW Incidental and ROW Acquisition, Construction and Construction Inspection Phases; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Livingston County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the above-subject project; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Livingston County Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Chairman of the Board to pay in the first instance 100% of the federal and non-federal share of the cost of Preliminary Engineering, Design, ROW Incidental and ROW Acquisition, Construction and Construction Inspection Phases work for the Project or portions thereof; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the sum of \$3,874,988 is hereby appropriated from Livingston County Budget Appropriation and made available to cover the cost of participation in the above phase of the Project; and be it further

RESOLVED, that in the event the full federal and non-federal share costs of the project exceeds the amount appropriated above, the Livingston County Board of Supervisors shall convene as soon as possible to appropriate said excess amount immediately upon the notification by the Livingston County Highway Superintendent thereof; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Board of the Livingston County Board of Supervisors be and is hereby authorized to execute all necessary Agreements, certifications or reimbursement requests for Federal Aid and/or Marchiselli Aid on behalf of the County of Livingston with the New York State Department of Transportation in connection with the advancement or approval of the Project and providing for the administration of the Project and the municipality's first instance funding of project costs and permanent funding of the local share of federal-aid and state-aid eligible Project costs and all Project costs within appropriations therefore that are not so eligible; and be it further

1. 24th ANNUAL EMPLOYEE RECOGNITION CEREMONY - HONORING EMPLOYEES WITH 10 AND 25 YEARS OF FULL-TIME SERVICE

Chairman David LeFeber

I would like to welcome everyone. It is certainly an honor for me to have the pleasure of welcoming our employees here for honoring them for all the great work they do for the county. Employees and department heads are really the folks out there providing the service to our constituents and it is excellent service. It is a great reflection on County government, the work that everyone does and certainly a great pleasure to recognize those of you that have been with us for 10 and 25 years.

County Administrator Ian Coyle

Likewise I also appreciate all of your service and would like to say a few words to kickoff the 24th Annual Employee Recognition Ceremony after which I will turn it over to Michele to go over the logistics and the process here today. On behalf of the Board we are very proud and we're honored to be up here in front of you talking about employee recognition and some milestone work anniversaries. We are also very grateful to be standing up here, period, because last year we could not do the ceremony. We have actually done this twice in the last few weeks because we are making up for lost time. We are very much blessed to be in the company of such incredible public servants. You are the

essential workforce members that we hear so much about. You are all the frontline staff; you are the heroes of what has been the pandemic response over the last eighteen months. The wheels of county government did not stop turning because a pandemic hit. In fact, in many areas we had to ramp up service provision to respond to the changing needs. I could not be more proud and the Board could not be more proud of the work of all of the County staff over the last eighteen months. So, what is employee recognition? It's a time to reflect on the service tenure of our dedicated employees for their 25 and 10 year marks. It's an opportunity to take some time out of our busy schedules to express some appreciation for the doers of county government. You all make county government work. As Michele mentioned, I have one of the Conversations with the County coming up in Livonia next week. We have been doing these for a couple of years now and I usually start almost every one with a scenario where I talk about County Government 101. I tell those listening, how county government started, and I also fast forward to the incredible work you all do each and every day. One example I went through when I last did this town hall series was involving a simple fall. A call comes to 911, the Livingston County the Sheriff's Office responds with County Emergency Medical Services because there are injuries. They drive over a County highway road and highway bridge that we maintain to get to the scene. The victim is treated and there are some mental health concerns related to the individual's condition and a referral is made to that department, also a County division. Additionally, the gentleman is due for his second vaccine shot and he is scheduled through our Department of Health to get that done. The individual is down on his luck and has lost his job, so he is referred to the County Workforce Development Office about job options. He gets some information from Social Services to see about public assistance to get back on his feet. The same elderly individual who fell is also a veteran, and when being treated for medical care, realized there are additional benefits that he is entitled to, so he goes to our Veterans Services Office. Because of his injuries, he temporarily needs to rehab and does a short stint at the Center for Nursing and Rehabilitation for those therapy services. Once back at home, he returns to his daily deliveries of meals from the Office for the Aging. That is nearly a dozen service areas touched in County government with one single random incident that has probably happened many, many times. While this particular example I chose starts with an unfortunate origin, which is a fall, countless other examples abound whereby the service touch points are many, involving a clinic, a trip to the DMV, changing enrollment for an election. The point being that the County government workforce is a true life cycle service provider. If you look at this list in the program, we have the Board of Elections, Emergency Management, Personnel, the nursing home, Central Services, Conflict Defender, Treasurer, Department of Health, Department of Social Services, Sheriff and Workforce.
