Census 2010 collected data for both race and Hispanic origin. Hispanic or Latino origin is considered an ethnicity, not a race. People who identify their origin as Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish may be any race. The Census Bureau uses the terms “Hispanic or Latino” and “Hispanic” interchangeably, which refer to a person of Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin regardless of race. More than half of the total population growth in the U.S. between 2000 and 2010 was due to the increase in Hispanic population.
